Newcastle Art Space (NAS) is a crucial entry point for emerging artists and those rekindling their professional arts practice in the Hunter Region. For more than 40 years, we have been bringing artists together and supporting their creative and professional development - from those launching their careers through to established practitioners seeking to evolve their practice and share knowledge.

For artists, we provide a vital link to fellow artists and arts industry professionals, and forge connections to audiences and buyers. For the community, we offer opportunities to experience art and engage with artists through exhibitions, talks, workshops and events.

We are located in O Block, an old painters and decorators teaching shed at Tighes Hill TAFE in Newcastle/Muloobinba. Clay Room Tighes Hill is housed alongside NAS in O Block, providing clay workshops and classes for all skill levels. This vibrant and bustling education and production space for all things clay engages more than 200 students each year, adding to the dynamism and creative exchange on offer on site. Inside, NAS is an accessible and appealing exhibition venue. The gallery is available for low-cost rental and operates through a mix of open calls and in-house proposals. This is a supportive environment for artists, especially those new to exhibiting. Exhibitors benefit from our growing and diversifying audience base, along with the gallery's solid sales history.

Our hub of more than 20 studios provides spaces for individual and collaborative creative development. The diversity of artists provides an environment where peers can benefit from incidental support and learning, along with access to NAS creative and professional development programming.

Our annual program of prizes includes the prestigious Hunter Emerging Art Prize. We also offer an annual Mentorship Program which pairs emerging artists and curators with established professionals. With this opportunity, NAS positions itself as a centre for emerging artists in the Hunter Region, a place where risks, experimentation and collaboration are actively encouraged. The program involves professional development and networking opportunities, and culminates in a major exhibition at NAS.

Our strategic plan articulates our aim to expand these offerings to host a rich annual program of masterclasses, workshops, residencies and internships.

GOVERNANCE

The Board of Directors has worked to strengthen and re-energise the organisation following the crisis of COVID and its aftermath. In 2023, we were able to address many strategic projects that had been moving slowly or put to one side during the previous years.

The main objective was to improve our governance framework through a major overhaul of our constitution and development of a new strategic plan. We completed work to revise the constitution in late 2023 thanks to generous pro bono assistance from Sparke Helmore Lawyers. The new Strategic Plan was put out for consultation mid-2023 and finalised later in the year.

NEW CONSTITUTION

The previous NAS Constitution was adopted in April 2007. Since then, the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) was established and has become NAS's primary regulator. The ACNC sets standards which all registered charities and its governing board members must meet in order to maintain charity registration. The ACNC published a template constitution for companies limited by guarantee which includes best practice governance procedures and which the ACNC encourages all registered charities that are incorporated as companies limited by guarantee to adopt.

With this in mind, the directors sought assistance from legal firm Sparke Helmore Lawyers to prepare a new constitution. We sincerely thank Julien Castaldi, Isabelle Hazell and the Sparke Helmore Pro Bono Team for their excellent work.

Our new constitution:

- Brings NAS's governing document into line with current ACNC models and standards.
- Introduces simpler processes for membership, including a more flexible clause with respect to membership fees which allows the directors to determine the application fee amount and annual subscription fee amount (if any) and a due date for payment.
- Provides a clearer process for election and succession of the directors, with each director required to retire/stand for renomination at least once every three years.
- Improves the function of general meetings (members' meetings), including new clauses that clarify how members can propose resolutions and statements.
- Amends clauses to address recent changes to the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 (Cth) regarding the administration of Cultural Organisations (the deductible gift recipient endorsement category NAS is registered as).

STRATEGIC PLAN

To mark the 'mid-life' milestone of NAS turning 40 this year, the directors worked to define and redefine our organisation and its role in our region's rich and growing cultural scene. The process involved studio artists, members, volunteers, arts professionals, partner organisations and other friends of NAS.

We believe the new Strategic Plan 2023-2028 captures many of the fresh ideas that have been bubbling up around the organisation and brings new clarity to our approach.

This five-year vision aims to sharpen our focus yet widen our lens. Within the local arts ecology, NAS has evolved as a crucial entry point for emerging artists and those rekindling their professional arts practice. Over the coming years, we aim to make that entry point more accessible and inclusive, and to nurture a creative hub that lifts up and supports Hunter-based artists through relevant programming, ethical partnerships and new opportunities to collaborate.

Strengthening organisational funding and improving our accommodation will be key issues for the organisation over the coming five years. These priorities are clearly articulated in the new strategic plan and will drive our actions and decisions.

FINANCIAL POSITION

The 2023 year brought a shift in our financial strategy, with a new staff structure and a commitment to diversifying our income streams through our programming, membership and fundraising. Underpinning our financial strategy is a strong commitment to provide appropriate resources to improve services and value to our studio artists, members, exhibitors, mentors, and all users and visitors.

NAS ended the year with a deficit of \$8,260, in line with our increased investment in staffing in the second half of 2023. Cash reserves remain sound, sitting at \$85,876 at 31 December 2023, a reduction of \$3,372 from the previous EOY.

Our income includes funds from prize entries and hosting fees, gallery hire and sales, masterclass fees and membership. Strong sales in the gallery of more than \$35,000 in 2023 reflect a full, diverse and appealing gallery program and new audience development initiatives.

In addition to these income streams, we are planning to increase revenue in 2024 through grants, donations and targeted fundraising. It is hoped that increased income from these sources will assist to better serve our studio artists and members, and provide for the future. In 2023 non-rental sources of income accounted for 40% of NAS income, up from 33% the previous year.

CURRENT STAFF

Madeleine K. Snow is the Creative Programs Manager at NAS. She commenced this role in August 2023 and is responsible for the creative direction of the art space, including curating exhibitions, managing public programs and art prizes. Madeleine has extensive experience in the arts industry, working in arts management, education and curating. She is a published art history writer and cultural producer.

She curated *Female Drivers*, an exhibition for Maitland Regional Art Gallery (MRAG), as well as *Seeing Red* for The Lock Up (TLU). *Seeing Red* was part of Hunter Red, a Hunter-wide collaboration across arts institutions including Newcastle Art Gallery, MAC Yapang, MRAG and TLU. Madeleine also works as a Fine Arts Teacher at Hunter TAFE in the field of Art History and Museum Practice. She was previously the Visual Art Producer for This is Not Art (TiNA) and now sits on the TiNA Board.

Madeleine has worked in the museum and gallery sector at Casula Powerhouse Art Centre, Liverpool Regional Museum, Penrith Regional Gallery, Lismore Regional Gallery, and the then named Lake Macquarie City Art Gallery (now MAC Yapang). She began her career as a Teacher/Lecturer at the Art Gallery of NSW and as a Museum Educator at the Museum of Contemporary Art Sydney. Madeleine is passionate about working with artists both emerging and established, and curating exhibitions.

Jo Dyer is the Finance and Systems
Coordinator. She commenced the newly
created role in July 2023 and is primarily
responsible for bookkeeping, website
maintenance and the ongoing improvement of
the organisation's administrative processes.

Jo has over 15 years' experience as both a practising artist and in administrative roles, having worked primarily in the architecture industry in Newcastle and Melbourne since 2012. Jo graduated with a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Newcastle in 2008, majoring in Creative Arts. She has since completed a Diploma in Business Administration (2016) and a Master of Fine Art from RMIT (2024).

As an artist, Jo works across disciplines including painting, installation and assemblage. She was a finalist for painting in the Newcastle Emerging Art Prize in 2013 (now the Hunter Emerging Art Prize) and has had solo exhibitions in Newcastle, Sydney and Melbourne. Despite fitting the stereotype of 'the creative', Jo is equally passionate about her administrative work and feels it is truly her dream job to work as part of the NAS team to facilitate and support the smooth operation of Newcastle Art Space and the delivery of its creative program.

Jennie Williams is the Admin and Membership Coordinator. She is also a new resident studio artist at NAS in the field of ceramics, and recently completed a Diploma of Ceramics at Newcastle Art School Hunter TAFE. She has extensive experience in customer service, retail and administrative roles. Jennie has also worked for SBS Television in the subtitling and language services departments.

Jennie brings to NAS her energy and enthusiasm for working with people, and particularly liaising with the team of studio artists and volunteers.

PREVIOUS STAFF

Leah Fawthrop left her position as Business Manager in August 2023, having worked across administrative and creative programming at NAS since early 2019.

Through her initiative, the organisation has taken our professional development programming online with a series of video tutorials on the NAS website, including the excellent interview with Belinda Street and Rachel Milne about how to enter art prizes. She fostered a partnership with Curious Legends to access substantial federal funding for microgrants and small-scale creative projects designed to re-establish audiences and markets following the COVID lockdowns. She also continued the NAS internship program into 2021, providing opportunities for three new and talented artsworkers to learn with us.

Leah helped secure additional sponsors for the Hunter Emerging Art Prize, allowing us to expand our prize offering, and worked with curator Louise Faulkner to bring the highly successful 'Clouds' and 'Clouds 2022' exhibitions to NAS.

The mentorship program also continued, and under her management a new 'Date-a-Curator' event was added, bringing in curators from the region's public and private galleries to meet with the mentees. This successful event has become part of the annual program and provides a unique opportunity for emerging artists to meet with and present their work to curators and other arts professionals.

We acknowledge these significant contributions and thank Leah for her role at NAS.

PROGRAMS

We continued to strengthen and expand our programs in 2023, with a full and diverse exhibition program, an Aboriginal residency project, new masterclasses and participation in the IGN Art Fair.

The successful exhibition State of Clay has sparked us to follow up, with an exciting new clay-focused show to feature in our program for 2024. The Ninuku Arts Studio Residency Cultural Exchange was a deeply enriching addition to this year's program, as was Michael Bell's Masterclass. This masterclass, along with Pablo Tapia's painting demonstration signalled our commitment to reinvigorating our hands-on workshops and artist-led presentations at NAS.

In conjunction with the Independent Galleries Network's Art Fair, in May we hosted a Meet the Curators session which provided a valuable opportunity for studio artists to meet with new staff from Newcastle Art Gallery (NAG). We were eager to hear about the major redevelopment of the gallery and NAG staff took the opportunity to visit artists' individual studios and hear about their practice.

In June we hosted sessions on Cash flow for Creatives and Networking for Creatives, sponsored by This is Not Art, Creative +Business, and Business Connect.

EXHIBITIONS

Exhibition programming saw NAS present a diverse mix of shows featuring established artists alongside emerging voices in Newcastle and the Hunter in 2023. NAS presented nine exhibitions in 2023, involving 350 artists, attracting an estimated audience of more than 3000 and yielding \$35,000 in art sales.

The program was representative of the NAS model for exhibitions – a mix of group and solo hire, responses to artist call-outs, collaborations with partners such as The Clay Room, Major art prizes, the Mentorship Exhibition, and special exhibitions from guest curators. *Reclaim* for artists with traumatic and acquired brain injury was curated by guest Curator Ash Campbell, while *Summer Salt* saw more than 60 artists respond to a call out and included a Ceramic Christmas Market with the Clay Room and local band The Breachers performing at the opening night. Aidan Gageler's solo exhibition followed his success at winning the 2023 Hunter Emerging Art Prize, and the popular *State of Clay* was a group hire by recent graduates in ceramics from Hunter TAFE.



MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

The NAS Mentorship Program is designed to connect, exchange, and engage artists, fostering a supportive and collegial environment for artistic growth.

By facilitating these interactions, we aim to inspire new directions and creative developments through the active exchange of ideas.

We encourage participants to make incremental yet impactful changes, emphasising the power of subtle shifts over drastic ones. Our Mentorship initiative celebrates both emerging and established artists from our region, promoting new collaborations and exploring diverse artistic connections. It also speaks to our exhibition programming, which is driven by presenting a dynamic mix of emerging voices side by side with established artists.

MENTORSHIPS IN 2023

The 2022/23 Mentorship Program saw 32 artists and 2 curators participate in the program, culminating in a final exhibition and publication, *TILT*, which launched in July 2023.

While these metrics outline the structure of the Mentorship Program, its true essence lies in the creative dialogue, opportunities for experimentation, and the expansive growth it fosters among participants. The program has provided a platform for dynamic creative exchanges in 2023.

Our 2022/23 Curatorial Mentee, Kar Mun Phoon worked with that year's cohort to produce a zine documented the process of the Mentorship Program through to the realisation of the exhibition.

There was also an activation of Studio 4 for an installation, and this space continues to be used as an installation and multimedia space into 2024.

A new Mentorship Program for 2023/24 began in October, engaging 25 artists and 2 curators.

MASTERCLASSES

On 18 November 2023, we hosted a mixed media creative workshop with renowned artist Michael Bell. This workshop targeting artists invited participants to explore various mediums and innovative approaches to enhance their creative practices.

Michael Bell is a nationally recognised artist with over 40 years of experience. He has held 24 solo exhibitions and participated in over 200 group shows. He has been a finalist twice in The Archibald Prize and five times in The Sulman Prize at the Art Gallery of NSW. His diverse portfolio includes designing graphics, posters, and illustrations for ABC Books, Triple J Radio, Mambo, and The Castanet Club. Bell is also a talented educator with extensive experience mentoring both emerging and established creatives.

On 7 December 2023, NAS hosted a free painting demonstration by artist **Pablo Tapia** titled 'Painting Like Clarice Beckett'. This was a live demonstration providing an in-depth exploration of the principles and methodology of Clarice Beckett's artistic process.

Pablo's demonstration celebrated the Australian Tonal Impressionist movement's enduring legacy, showcasing its relevance and vitality in contemporary art.

Attendees gained valuable insights into the techniques that have shaped some of Australia's most well-known artworks.

HUNTER EMERGING ART PRIZE

The Hunter Emerging Art Prize (HEAP) is a our region's premier annual art prize supporting the work of artists who identify as emerging. The finalists' exhibition at NAS is a significant focus fostering opportunities for emerging creatives in the Hunter. The judges are local arts industry experts. In 2023 they were Graeme Wilson, Madeleine K. Snow and Courtney Wagner. Aiden Gageler was the winner in 2023 and went on to be selected as a finalist in the prestigious Ramsay Art Prize for contemporary art at the Art Gallery of South Australia.


NINUKU ARTS CULTURAL EXCHANGE RESIDENCY

Through a series of working bees, Studio 10 was activated as a project space in 2023 beginning with a cultural exchange from Ninuku Arts from 23 October -1 November 2023. This initiative saw us welcome visiting artists from the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands. This exchange and connection between Ninuku Arts and Newcastle Art Space was established by studio artist, Eila Vinwynn, during her time managing the centre in recent years.

We were honoured to welcome Yangi Yangi Fox, her daughter Renae Fox, Carol Young, her niece Cassaria Young-Hogan, and Linda Eddy, who traveled from some of the most remote communities in the APY Lands. Ninuku Arts, located in Kalka, a desert community near the South Australia and Western Australia border, has a rich tradition and creative community. Yangi Yangi Fox, a cultural leader and Board Member of Ninuku Arts, is also the Deputy Chair and former Director of the Ngaanyatjarra Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara Women's Council. Celebrated for her work as a Tjanpi Desert Weaver, Yangi Yangi has exhibited both nationally and internationally.

This cultural exchange provided a unique opportunity for both Indigenous and non-Indigenous Novocastrians to deepen their understanding of Anangu culture. The highlight of the exchange was a BBQ lunch held on October 28, where the community had the chance to meet the artists, visit the new studio, and view works in progress created during their residency in Newcastle. These works were subsequently exhibited in the NAS end of year exhibition Summer Salt.

Into 2024, we will continue to consider Studio 10 and other studios in NAS as potential multi-use spaces for collaborations, residencies, workshops and other projects.
